

RECIPE: AUGUST - Sweet Chilli Prawns: Serves 4 (No cooking) Delicious added to a jacket potato, or makes a great sandwich filling.

500g cooked & peeled prawns 1 red pepper, deseeded and roughly chopped 4 tomatoes, chopped 1 level tablespoon sweet chilli sauce 120g quark Handful of fresh coriander Salt & freshly ground black pepper

- 1) In a large bowl, mix the prawns, pepper, tomatoes, sweet chilli sauce and quark.
- 2) Scatter the coriander over and season.
- 3) Cover and chill until needed.

GARDENING NOTES: AUGUST

- 1) Mow the lawn on a weekly basis, but do not feed any more.
- 2) Remove any dead, diseased or damaged branches of fruit trees.
- 3) Pick fruit and vegetables for storage, freezing or preserving.
- 4) Harvest herbs for drying.
- 5) Check plants for mildew, and cut off affected parts be sure to dispose of them in a bin, or burn them.
- 6) Put out a supply of water for thirsty birds and insects.







<u>Heart Healthy Spaghetti Bolognese</u>

Ingredients

500g (11b 2oz) extra lean minced beef 1 onion, chopped 1 clove of garlic, crushed 2 carrots, finely chopped 175g (6oz) mushrooms, finely chopped 3 sticks celery, finely chopped 400g (14oz) can chopped tomatoes 2 tablespoons tomato puree 2 teaspoons dried Italian herb seasoning or dried mixed herbs 300ml (1/2 pint) beef stock, made from a low-salt or no-salt beef stock cube 150ml (1/4 pint) red wine (If you don't want to use wine you can use some extra beef Stock) Freshly ground black pepper, to taste

400g (14oz) dried spaghetti (white or wholemeal) Chopped fresh parsley, to garnish

Method

1. Place minced beef, onion and garlic in large saucepan and cook gently, stirring occasionally, until mince is lightly browned all over

2. Add carrots, mushrooms and celery to pan and cook for 5 minutes. Stir in tomatoes, tomato puree, dried herbs, stock, wine and black pepper

3. Bring to the boil, then reduce heat, cover and simmer for 1 hour, stirring occasionally.

 Check sauce and serve as it is, or if you'd prefer it thicker, remove lid, increase heat slightly and simmer until the sauce is the thickness you would like
Meanwhile, cook spaghetti in large saucepan of boiling water until pasta is just cooked or al dente. Drain thoroughly

6. Pile cooked spaghetti onto warm serving plates and spoon Bolognese sauce over top.

7. Garnish with chopped parsley and serve with mixed green salad.
